“Thanks to the incredible generosity of James and Eleanor Randall, each year we will be able to deploy funds wherever there is the greatest need and ensure that Huntington Hospital remains at the forefront of breast cancer care and treatment. By doing so, Huntington will remain a beacon of hope for thousands of women in our region now and for generations to come.”

Dr. Williamson explains that the funds may be used to support advanced diagnostic and therapeutic services or to introduce new and advanced care protocols or new technologies. Other potential uses of funds could include care-coordination services to help patients navigate their complex care needs, pain-management and palliative-care services that reduce discomfort and enhance quality of life, support and assistance for patients’ families, dietitian services, leading-edge research that further enhances care, and general upgrades to the Randall Breast Center facilities as needed.

Inspired in part by their personal experience, the Randalls felt compelled to give back to the breast center that was, for them, “an oasis in the midst of the chaos that comes with a cancer diagnosis.” When asked how they felt about their generous gift that will secure vital care for women in the San Gabriel Valley and beyond, Eleanor simply answered that she is “happy knowing that countless other women will be able to get the same care as I did.”

Huntington Hospital’s breast cancer program brings together a specialized team of highly trained breast cancer experts – physicians, nurse navigators and other healthcare professionals—who integrate multiple disciplines in a compassionate, comprehensive approach. FLU SEASON IS IN FULL SWING!

The Pasadena Public Health Department, under the authority of §120175 of the CA Health and Safety Code, has issued that healthcare workers must either be vaccinated or wear a mask in order to prevent the transmission of the influenza virus to patients; flu season is defined as November 1, 2014 – March 31, 2015. Healthcare workers who get vaccinated will be issued a sticker that will be placed on their badge identifying them as vaccinated. Those who decline the vaccination must wear a surgical mask when they are within three (3) feet of patients.

If you would like to get vaccinated you can come to Employee Health/HACC, between the hours of 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday – Friday, for a free vaccination (your sticker will be issued after being vaccinated).

If you have already been vaccinated please complete the Seasonal Flu Vaccine Attestation or Declination Form and return it to the Medical Staff Office either via fax (626-397-2912) or email bianca.irizarry@huntingtonhospital.com. If you have submitted the form you may obtain your sticker in the Medical Staff Office between the hours of 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday – Friday.

for some time now, others have yet to be imagined. It is without saying that this tumultuous environment has led to increased stress and concern over what the future holds for each of us in our careers. It is because of this, that the concept of the medical community that works together, is proactive, and supports each other through these winds of change is ever more necessary. This is our time, our town, and our hospital. No individual practitioner should find himself wishing for the support of other physicians, whether it be for call coverage, case discussion, or effective representation with insurance carriers or governance organizations. Instead, active participation should be taken to not only represent individual interests but also the interests of others within the hospital staff.

In our recent visit by The Joint Commission (TJC) to our institution, the lead examiner for the group noted a rapid rise in the number of reported communication and behavioral issues over the last few years within our staff. He also noted that this has been a trend uniformly seen in other institutions on his tour of duty. It has been

put forth as a symptom of our time, and the increasing stress associated with the practice of medicine. We have the opportunity to change this. As well as supporting each other as a community to assure best methods of practice, we can engage and educate each other with issues as they arise. It is this notion of teamwork, communication, and active participation that will set us apart from other hospitals. We have already been servicing the community for over 100 years, we are nationally recognized in a number of specialties, and we are one of the few stand-alone, private hospitals, that remains strong as we move forth into a new era of medicine. But, if we fail, remain fragmented, divisive, we will falter, and we will find ourselves answering to others in regard to the needs and requirements of our chosen profession. We need to remember that we have the ability, knowledge, and support of those around us to help better define what it means to be a physician in the oncoming years.



A New Year's Resolution Checklist

New Year's resolutions have a habit of falling by the wayside about mid-February. What if you could put your resolutions on autopilot and reap the rewards of having accomplished them all year long? Here's a checklist of five resolutions that will help you do just that!

1. Resolve to keep up with the literature that matters most to you:

Decide on the top 2 or 3 journal titles that contain the most relevant articles being published in your field and have the library set up Table of Contents alerts.

2. Resolve to get access from off-site:

Contact the library to learn how to access library resources from within Cerner or to set up username / password access for selected resources.

3. Resolve to add authoritative information resources to your mobile device home screen:

Tired of searching Google and getting a kajillion hits? Add the library's website and electronic resources to the home screen of your mobile and give yourself one tap access to a wealth of trusted medical information (<http://huntingtonhospital.libguides.com/>). Email library to be sent resource specific URLs and mobile access information.

4. Resolve to set up your UpToDate Anywhere account for your mobile device:

To access UpToDate from off-site and track your CME credits on your mobile device, complete one of the following:

- **If You Have Never Registered for an UTD Account:** Register for a username/ password from a hospital networked computer (click on the Register link at the top right from within UTD); then, download the UTD app for your device (iOS, Android or Windows 8) and log in with your newly created username and password.
- **If You Already Have an UTD Account From Huntington Hospital:** Just download the UTD mobile app for your device (iOS, Android or Windows 8) and log in using your previously created username/password.
- **If You Created an UTD Account at a Previous Institution (or as an individual subscriber):** On a Huntington Hospital networked computer, log in using your previously created account username/password to transfer your account over to the hospital's institutional subscription.

Additional Information: Accounts can be used on up to 2 devices. Users need to log in to their UpToDate account every 30 days at a hospital networked computer for uninterrupted access.

5. Resolve to peruse the new Palliative Care specialty in UpToDate:

Providing 150 clinical and patient education topic summaries, evidence-based practice recommendations and pain/non-pain symptom management across many disciplines, UTD's new specialty on Palliative Care has pertinent information for every clinician.

Recent HANK Changes

While there have been a number of changes made in the past month, some of the most significant changes and reminders are:

❖ Use of Communication Orders

Communication orders should only be used to communicate instructions to nursing. They should never be used in place of placing actual orders (ex: medications, tests, etc). Why? First, there is a potential patient safety impact as communication orders do not have clinical decision support enabled. Second, there is a delay in patient care as communication orders go directly to nursing and other clinical staff (ex: Pharmacy, Radiology, Lab, etc.) are not able to see these.

Going forward, when nursing receives a communication order that is really a medication or test order, they will contact the ordering physician to have the order entered or to take a telephone order.

❖ PowerNote - Default Note Type

Previously, Cerner defaulted the last note type when you created a new PowerNote. Often times, this resulted in the wrong note type being associated with your documentation. As a result, this default was removed. When you go to the +Add to create a new note. Click on the note you desire, the system will present you with a recommended note type. If there is no note type association you will get a yellow required field that you must select from the dropdown.

❖ PowerNote - Auto-populate

We have heard that it takes too long to load new PowerNotes. As a result, we turned off the auto-populate pop up screen that appears prior to your PowerNote loading. Once your PowerNote is open, you can still pull information into your note and pre-completed notes will still populate.

❖ Medication Reconciliation

When completing admission medication reconciliation, please be sure to check to see if the medication history is complete. There are times where nursing will begin documenting medication history but leave it incomplete. A good example of this is where the patient isn't aware of all of their medications and a family member is bringing them. When in the ordering screen or medication reconciliation routine, the status icons will appear at the top of the screen. The blue exclamation mark means that it is incomplete and the green check mark indicates that it is complete.

❖ **Monitor Upgrades for Physician Workstations**

Over the past couple of months we have been working on upgrading physician workstations that are located in patient care areas to 22” monitors. This has been completed in the West Tower and is 80% complete in the East Tower. The South Campus will be addressed next.

❖ **Converting a Problem to a Diagnosis**

When reviewing problems, you are able to convert these into Diagnosis by right clicking on the problem and selecting ‘Convert to Diagnosis’. You are also able to set your personal preferences to either sort problems or filter problems. This is useful if you only want to see medical problems, which are those entered by physicians.



The Transitional Care Medication Assessment Program

A new service for discharged patients

The Transitional Care Medication Assessment Program (TCMAP) is a new outpatient service offered at the Medication Therapy Management Clinic and provides education and medication assessment to patients within 1 week after hospital discharge. There is currently no charge for the service and patients can be enrolled into the program by a health care provider. Candidates for the program include patients discharged with a primary diagnosis known to have a high risk for hospital readmission, those on multiple chronic medications, patients with low health literacy or medication adherence issues, and any patient interested in medication review. The pharmacists at the MTM Clinic will screen all medications and supplements for potential interactions, help resolve any medication discrepancies or drug-related problems, assist in providing cost-effective solutions to a patient’s drug therapy regimen and help ensure patients have a follow-up appointment with their primary care physician/specialist. Patients are seen at the clinic within one week after discharge and a follow-up telephone call is placed one week after that. The encounter notes and updated medication history will be documented in CERNER. Goals of the clinic include optimizing medication adherence, preventing emergency room visits and hospital readmissions, and providing continuation of care from the hospital to outpatient encounters with the patient’s physician. Shine a Light on Lung Cancer

On Sunday, November 16, Huntington Memorial Hospital hosted a lighting ceremony as part of a national campaign to raise awareness for lung cancer. The ceremony was attended by over 100 lung cancer patients and family members as well as hospital administration, staff and physicians from Huntington's lung cancer program. The program included remarks by Robbin Cohen, MD, medical director for the thoracic oncology program, in addition to comments from patients who have been successfully treated at Huntington Hospital.

This timely event is on the heels of recent news from the federal government announcing a proposal for Medicare to cover annual screenings for lung cancer for older Americans with long histories of heavy smoking. "Affordable and accessible screenings for lung cancer in high-risk patients has the potential to save many lives," said Dr. Cohen. "Having said that we are equally committed to providing comprehensive care at every stage of the disease."

The Lung Cancer Program at Huntington Hospital is recognized as one of the largest



and most comprehensive programs of its kind in the Los Angeles area. Other members of Huntington Hospital's thoracic oncology program team that attended Sunday's event were Mark McNamara, MD; Michael Gurevitch, MD; and Kenneth Lam, MD.

The ceremony was just one of nearly 200 "Shine a Light on Lung Cancer" events taking place in cities across the country in November. The program is presented in partnership with Lung Cancer Alliance, the only national nonprofit organization dedicated solely to providing support and advocacy for people living with or at risk for lung cancer. Combined these events mark the largest lung cancer event in the world.
